The Reading Curriculum

At St Marks Nursery we hope that every child **will be able to do the following before moving to Reception-**

*To have some favourite story books, rhymes and songs

*To be able to repeat phrases from familiar stories and rhymes

*To be able to suggest how a story may end

*To listen to stories one to one and in a group showing good listening and attention

*To describe story settings, events and characters

*To recognise print in the environment and in their every day life

*To recognise their own name

*To handle books carefully, independently and with interest

*To hold the book the correct way up and turn the pages one by one

*To show an interest in illustrations



What we do in Nursery

To help your child meet these targets we complete a variety of tasks with them throughout the year such as-

*Learning a Rhyme a week as well as listening to new songs and rhymes

*A 'story' a week that represents our topic

*One to One story times and large group story times

*Show and Tell a story
